

5 Ways to Fix Verb Tense Consistency in Your Essay Writing

The truth is that most college essays have school-level writing mistakes in them. You must avoid run-on sentences, verb tense inconsistency, and other common grammatical errors to get the best possible grade. Verb tense consistency

The time period within a sentence or clause should be consistent. Mostly in narrative essay writing, students don't take care of the past, present, and future tenses. An example of an inconsistent sentence would be: When John was about to eat the last piece of candy, he is thinking about sharing it with his sister. It should instead be written as: When John was about to eat the last piece of candy, he thought about sharing it with his sister.

How to approach the problem

After you are ready to write the final draft, keep in mind that you need to keep the verb tense consistent. Whenever you are writing a clause check if the sentence is consistent or not. You can also contact an online writing service and tell them to "write paper for me in the given time". Additionally, tell them that there should be no mistakes in grammar or structure.

Tips to fix Verb tense consistency

- **Keep the tense in mind**

Before you start writing, keep in mind that you cannot afford to make grammatical mistakes. Give yourself a lot of time to write the perfect paper. If an event has already occurred, use the past tense (e.g., I ate dinner). If the event is happening, use the present tense (e.g., John is currently cleaning his room). Subsequently, if the event is going to happen later, use the future tense (e.g., John will wake up at 7 am tomorrow for school)

- **Specific academic paper advice**

Sometimes it isn't very clear whether to use past, present, or future tense. Remember to use the past tense for the work of an author that has been published. Let's suppose you are to write a proposal and discuss the methodology you will use. As you haven't conducted the research yet, you will use the past tense. While referring to an on-going investigation or when stating facts, use the present tense.

- **Present tense**

Most mistakes are made in the present tense. You must remember the difference between past, present perfect, and present continuous tenses. Using the latter with the past tense is not appropriate. An example of the present perfect tense is "John has already cleaned up.". this may seem like the past tense but it isn't.

- **Proofreading**

After you have completed the final draft, don't immediately submit it. Check each paragraph for inconsistency and make the required corrections. Analyze the whole paragraph and specific verbs in them. When all the verbs are in a similar tense you are good to go. You can also submit your paper on an online grammar-checking website. These websites are not always very accurate so it is wise to check the work manually as well

- **Let someone else do it**

If you are finding it difficult to proofread, there's an alternative. You can hire an essay writer to proofread your document for errors. They will read each paragraph thoroughly and correct all inconsistencies. If you still aren't satisfied, ask them to write you a whole new essay.

Conclusion

Grammatical errors are the biggest contributors to bad grades. You should check your whole paper for inconsistency in tenses, structure, and grammar before submitting it. If you believe that your writing skills
