Purpose of Using Direct Quotes

Sometimes when you rephrase a statement, the meaning behind those original words is lost. You may not be able to use those strong and vivid words in your paraphrased version of that statement. How Much of Direct Quotes are Enough?

You're advised to keep the quantity of these quotes minimum. Stick to 1-2 quotes per essay.

How to Effectively Integrate Direct Quotations?

Now that you know adding direct quotes makes your essay look all the more credible so you may be wondering how to integrate them. The best way to use them in your argumentative essays is by keeping in check the following points:

Integrate short quotes.

The phrase "less is more" perfectly applies in the context of adding direct quotes. It is preferred that you choose to add short quotes rather than lengthy ones. It is an absolute myth that long quotes are best to prove a point.

Adding a quote of only few words is ideal. You're advised to avoid integrating quotes in your essays that are too wordy as they stick out and draw attention away from your original argument.

Always explain the significance of the quote

After you add a quote to your essay, the next step is to explain and justify its significance. You do not just put a quote and leave it there for people to assume its importance themselves.
